# **Theoretical Foundations**

#### **Educational Theories Behind the Curriculum**

This curriculum is built on a blend of Islamic pedagogy and modern educational theory. Each theory contributes to how students learn, interact, and grow—linguistically, intellectually, and spiritually.

# 1. Socio-Cultural Theory (Vygotsky)

Purpose: Learning happens through interaction and social context. Application:

• Students work in pairs and groups to build meaning together.

• Teachers scaffold tasks—starting with support, then gradually removing it. **Example from the Book**: In Unit 8, students collaborate to write and perform a drama about global challenges. The teacher guides them through brainstorming, then lets them lead the performance.

#### 2. CLIL (Content and Language Integrated Learning)

• Lessons include poetry (linguistic), gallery walks (visual), role-play (bodily-kinesthetic), and group debates (interpersonal). **Example**: Unit 5 includes a poetry performance where students express cultural identity through rhythm and voice.

# 4. Communicative Language Teaching (CLT)

Purpose: Focus on real-life communication, not just grammar drills. Application:

- Students engage in debates, interviews, presentations, and storytelling.
- Fluency and interaction are prioritized over perfection. **Example**: In Unit 7, students debate the ethics of artificial intelligence, using persuasive language and critical thinking.

# 5. Islamic Values Integration Theory

# **Teaching the Four Language Skills**

This section explains how the curriculum develops **Listening**, **Speaking**, **Reading**, **and Writing** in a way that's integrated, values-based, and student-centered. Each skill is taught not in isolation, but through meaningful tasks tied to real-world themes and Islamic ethics.

# Listening

**Purpose**: To help students understand spoken English in authentic contexts, while developing empathy and critical thinking.

# Approach:

- Pre-listening activities to activate background knowledge
- Guided listening with comprehension questions
- Post-listening reflection and discussion
- Use of authentic materials: interviews, speeches, Qur'anic recitations

**Example from the Book**: In Unit 2, students listen to a recording titled "Respecting Diversity in Islam". They answer comprehension questions, then reflect on

how diversity is treated in their own communities.

#### **Speaking**

# Reading

- How they can embody it in their community

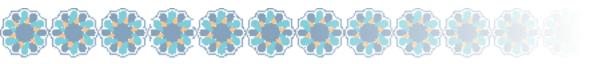

By choosing sources like Dr. Jim Taylor and Dr. Michael Gervais, the author relied on experts with solid backgrounds, which adds authority to the arguments presented.

"We should all raise our awareness of our thoughts and cultivate a positive mindset on our journeys to greatness."

Yes, a call to action is an effective way to end a speech because:

Islam emphasizes the importance of respecting diversity, as it acknowledges that people are created with differences in race, language, and beliefs. The Holy Quran addresses this directly in Surah Al-Hujurat (49:13), saying: "O mankind, We



have created you from male and female and made you peoples and tribes that you may know one another. Indeed, the most noble of you in the sight of Allah is the most righteous of you. Indeed, Allah is Knowing and Acquainted." This verse highlights the purpose of diversity, emphasizing mutual understanding and respect rather than discrimination.

Another verse, Surah Ar-Rum (30:22), states: "And of His signs is the creation of the heavens and the earth and the diversity of your languages and your colors. Indeed, these are signs for those of knowledge." This teaches that differences in appearance, speech, and culture are signs from Allah, meant to be appreciated as part of His creation.

Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) also exemplified respect for diversity, treating people of different ethnic backgrounds and religions with kindness. In his farewell sermon, he declared: "An Arab has no superiority over a non-Arab, nor does a non-Arab have any superiority over an Arab. A white has no superiority over a black, nor does a black have any superiority over a white; none have superiority over another except by piety and good action." This message reinforces that virtue and righteousness are the true measures of a person's worth.

By embracing diversity, Muslims contribute to a harmonious society, fulfilling the Quran's call for understanding and unity. Islam promotes respect for others, regardless of differences, reminding believers that diversity is a divine blessing, and that it's through mutual respect and understanding that peace and unity are achieved.
